Powder Horn Course Directors Conference

The Central Region Powder Horn Course Directors Conference is 6:00 pm Friday October 5th to 9:00 pm Saturday October 6th at the Super 8 Inn in Bonner Springs, Kansas. This conference is for anyone interesting in learning more about how to plan a Powder Horn Course. Future course directors, assistant course directors, staff advisors and other staff members make up a majority of the participants. This conference is **REQUIRED** for the course director, staff advisor, and the assistant course director assigned as the back-up course director within two of the course start. Councils considering holding a course in 2014, even 2015, are strongly encouraged to send the anticipated course director and several others to the 2012 conference. The information you gain from this conference will provide a strong foundation as you plan for your course. You need to be approved by the hosting region and have attended or will attend a Powder Horn in able to attend this conference.

The Powder Horn Course Director Conference will be comprised of an experienced staff of past and current Powder Horn course directors. The curriculum will cover a wide range of Powder Horn topics, including: course standards and guidelines ~ course format ~ council and national approval process ~ budgeting ~ staff selection and development ~ participant recruiting ~ logistics planning ~ program planning and instruction ~ newsletters ~ resource and give away items ~ living history ~ teen participation ~ web site and e-mail resources ~ and more! There will also be time set aside for answering questions about how to run a successful course. The Powder Horn syllabus has also been updated, so this conference is a great place to come and learn about those changes.

The course will cost \$59.00. The charge covers meals, Powder Horn Staff Guide, and all conference materials; however, it does not include lodging. The Super 8 Inn has discounted rooms available for \$67.12 per night, with double queen beds regularly at \$85.00. There are also other options nearby. You can also save by doubling up with a fellow scouter. Please reserve your room soon as there are only a limited number of rooms available at this price.

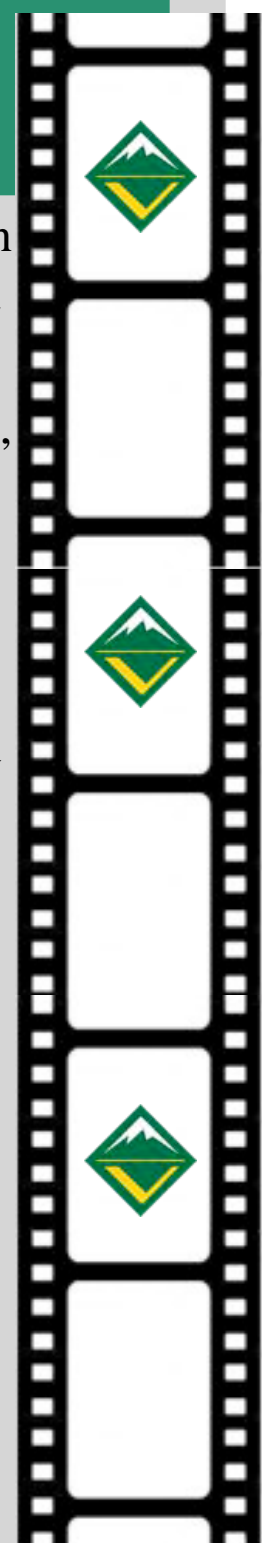
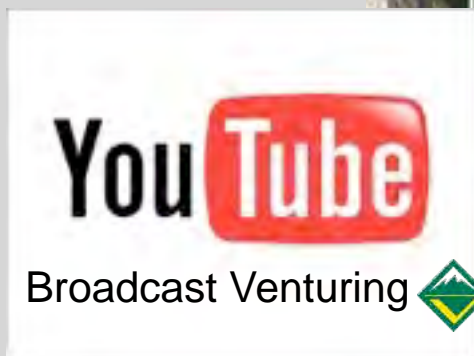

ADVANCEMENT OF THE MONTH



Outdoor Bronze Award

Award: Outdoor Bronze

Required Requirements: 6 out of 26

Estimated Time: 90 days or 3 months

The Outdoor Bronze usually takes about three months to complete, and the requirements are much more difficult and time consuming than those of the Arts and Hobbies Bronze, but here's a list of some things you can do this month to complete a requirement or three! And of course, once you get the Outdoor Bronze, you're half way to your ranger award!

Backpacking!

- Develop a personal exercise plan, and keep a daily diary of doing the exercises. Keep track of this for three months afterwards, and you're good to go!
- Learn about the proper handling and packing of a backpack, as well as group gear and personal gear.
- Lots of people like clothes! Learn about backpacking clothes, then demonstrate three uses for a poncho.
- Health and safety is important, so take time to learn about trail health considerations and hydration.

First Aid!

- Complete a standard first aid course or above, and you've got that covered!

Classes at School!

- It's the time of year where you've already started school, and also that time of year where you're going to start looking forward to winter break very soon. But in the mean time, if you're taking an elective communications class, you've got one core requirement done, just during school!

Be Prepared!

- If you don't already have this requirement filled, maybe you should think of doing this anyways. Discuss potential disasters and emergency preparedness in your family and come up with a family emergency plan. Also, build a family emergency kit and make a display or presentation to a group of youth on what you have learned.

Leave No Trace!

- Learn the principles of Leave No Trace and be able to recite and explain them (from memory). Usually, taking the full trainer course helps to, but it isn't required.

Project COPE!

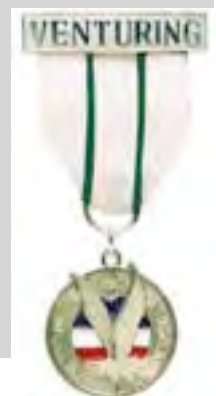
- COPE stands for Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience, and from experience, it's lots of fun. Usually it's one weekend, and the requirement is that you complete a course with both low and high initiatives.

What is stealth advancement?

Stealth advancement is completing requirements without even knowing.

Advisors and presidents, how can you help your crew to achieve stealth advancement?

- Incorporate requirements with activities
- Allow youth to plan events
- After events, sit down and look at the requirements you have completed.



SEA SCOUTS



Central Region Sea Badge



Seabadge is the official advanced Sea Scout training program for adult leaders. It is intended to assist leaders at all ship leadership levels to understand the larger role of Sea Scouting within Boy Scouts of America. Participants will learn leadership and management techniques that can improve the quality of their ships and ultimately council Sea Scouting programs. The goal is to apply these methods to expand Sea Scouting for a greater number of youths.

The next Central Region Seabadge training Conference is scheduled for Friday through Sunday, November 2-4, 2012 at Camp Illinek on Lake Springfield IL. The Seabadge participants will be selected from nominations recommended by their local council. A participant must be a registered Sea Scout leader in an active Sea Scout Ship or council officer who is nominated and is or will be working with Sea Scout Ships. The following conditions must be met before the conference:

1. Completed Adult Leader Specific Training and/or Adult Leader Sea Scout Specific Training and have completed Sea Scout Adult Leaders Basic Training (SSALBT) (if not available, Area Commodore's approval with application).
2. Have actively served in a registered position in Sea Scouting for at least one continuous year, and
3. Be nominated for participation by their local council.



The course fee is \$154. Formal application and payment will be done via the Abraham Lincoln Website.

Items which are ordered for participants may take up to two months for order preparation and shipping. Individuals waiting until the last minute may not receive materials in time.

This course can have only 30 participants, and due to the high demand and the limited number participant openings your immediate attention is requested. The \$154 fee includes all meals. It also includes billeting at the Scout Camp, but we only have space for 20 students to sleep at the camp. Students after that will have to either stay at a local hotel or camp on the site. Those spots will be first come first served so register early. Also, if for personal or medical reasons you need to stay in a hotel, then please let us know and we will open that bunk up to someone else. Please copy and share this with all Sea Scout professionals and Venturing professionals for their interest and support. Note that we need a minimum of 15 reservations to be able to run our course. Early applicants are needed to get this done.
